Mayor highlights town's 'changing face'

CHRISTOU **OPTIMISTIC ABOUT** IMPACT OF REGENERATION **PROJECTS**

imassol is undergoing a facelift, while remaining true to its traditional character, Mayor Andreas Christou told Rotarians on Wednes

Addressing the monthly dinner of the Limassol Berengaria club, Christou highlighted the many projects underway in the city. These include the development and upgrading of the area known as Peace Square between the Turkish Mosque and Agios Antonios Church in the Old Port sector of the historic old town. Close to this area are plans to build a major conference and exhibition centre as a BOT (build, operate and transfer) initia-tive "We believe this will

begin next year".

Many of the projects showed the dramatic changing face that Limassol is presenting to the international community.

Many of the bigger developments such as pedestrianising the Castle grounds and piazza, the Old Port regeneration and new terminal buildings, Limassol Marina development and local infrastructure upgrades are well underway. Some other projects, for example, 'lift-ing' the facades of some of the existing seafront buildings, now over 30 years old

and looking 'tired', will begin next year.

Christou was keen to emphasise these will not be rebuilt, but 'refreshed'. He highlighted the striking contemporary buildings like the Olympic Residence and Pafilia project, which are dramatically changing the landscape of the seafront.

Two new seafront bridges to link the promenade to the sea are due to begin construction shortly. Many other smaller projects were highlighted including smaller sports and recreational grounds, arts centres and renovation programmes for local community project initiatives. The Pattichion Theatre, due to open soon following a major refurbish-

ment programme, the Municipal Zoo, due to complete in about three months, three boat launching ramps plus the infrastructure improvements and major road links that are currently being developed and others which are earmarked, including the notoriously uneven Lady's Mile road, and Garyllis River, within the Limassol municipality boundaries.

Taking questions from the guests, the Mayor spoke passionately about his opti-mism for Limassol as the city moves forward.

He talked about the ben-efits and "additional value" these projects will bring to the town, and stressed that one of the major assets for

the city is that it now boasts an impressive University -Cyprus University of Technology (TEPAK). A major issue in town is parking, EU funds. Asked what his proudest achievement is to date, Christou said "it is that we applied for and were awarded €50m from the EU for our regeneration programme. That made me very proud".

and there are ambitious plans to build an underground municipal car park although as the Mayor said "the issue is to get people out of their cars and using more buses, bikes and motorbikes...and walking, after all the distances are very small". Much of the work has been financed through
