Presidents announcements:

- 1. P Louisa commented that although the number of attendees was disappointing this was understandable owing to the very bad weather, however it was encouraging that so many had sent in apologies. This indicated that Members were becoming aware of the need to attend and participate.
- 2. P Louisa informed those present that Sec Friedrich Vogel was now permanently resident in Germany. 
