

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Reach Within to Embrace Humanity

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Message from the Deputy District Governor 2011-12 Themis Themistocleous

Fellow Rotarians,

In 1985, Rotary declared basic literacy to be a pre-condition to the development of peace. Through this organizational emphasis, more than half the world's 34,000 Rotary clubs address the full range of literacy and mathematical challenges for primary, vocational, and adult learners, as well as teacher training.

March is designated in the Rotary calendar as Literacy Month. It is said that if literacy were a simple problem, Rotarians would have solved it by now. The issues are myriad: a scarcity of schools and learning materials, insufficient government spending on education, and cultural stigmas that limit education for women and girls, to name a few. And the problem goes far beyond the inability to decipher words on a page. In an increasingly complex world, poor reading comprehension condemns adults to the lowest rungs of society.

Rotarians, however, are committed to improving the situation. Rotary clubs worldwide have been carrying out thousands of literacy projects for decades.

Rotary's work in literacy has included rebuilding schools destroyed by natural disasters, partnering with libraries to promote early childhood reading, and teaching students to read and write through the concentrated language encounter method.

Basic education and literacy is one of the six areas of focus for the new grant structure of the Rotary Foundation currently called "Future Vision Plan" which comes into effect globally on 1 July 2013. The specific goal envisaged by Future Vision states:

"The Rotary Foundation promotes education and literacy for all, by

- Ensuring that children have access to quality basic education
- Reducing gender disparity in education
- Increasing adult literacy
- Strengthening the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy Supporting studies related to basic education and literacy."

In Cyprus, clubs may wish to focus on adult literacy programmes. Many adults, not only in the developing world but also in developed countries, lack the skills they need to hold a job or get a new one, or to perform basic tasks required by everyday life. The hardships caused by illiteracy, from the difficulty in finding employment to the constant pressure to cover it up, often lead to a host of other problems.

I urge you to consider devoting resources, either individually or even better in cooperation with other clubs and other established organizations that have more expertise in the area, to plan and implement projects that not only raise the awareness of illiteracy and its impact on the community, but also deliver resources that will support literacy efforts.

Message from RI President 2011-12 KALYAN BANERJEE

"We need to commit ourselves absolutely and fully and say, What I must do shall indeed be done."

My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary,

In the first message I wrote for this magazine, last July, I quoted Mohandas K. Gandhi, who said, "You must be the change you wish to see in the world." And in the months since, I have had incredible opportunities to travel the Rotary world and see how Rotarians everywhere are bringing those words to life.

Creating positive change means, at its simplest, using our knowledge and resources to solve a problem. But when we are talking about solving humanitarian problems in a real and lasting way, knowledge and ideas and resources are not enough to ensure results. We have to remember something else that is no less important: sustainability.

A sustainable solution is one that will continue to work even after the Rotarians who proposed and facilitated it are gone. This means that even though the project might have come from Rotary originally, the community will take ownership of it. That, of course, means that when a part breaks on a water pump, there will be a process in place to repair it and to keep that pump functional – carried out by the community, and without further recourse to Rotary.

The first step toward sustainability is understanding the need – for example, the cooking fuel problem common in much of the developing world. In many regions, solar ovens are a wonderful solution: They are inexpensive; they rely on a source of energy that is free, nonpolluting, and inexhaustible; and they are simple to use and maintain.

But before we step into a community and attempt to solve its fuel problem with solar ovens, we have to fully understand its situation – and look beyond the problem we see. Perhaps the local foods need to be cooked at a temperature higher than the solar oven can provide. Perhaps the area is windy, and the solar ovens would blow away. Perhaps it's traditional in that area to begin cooking before dawn, which, of course, you cannot do with a solar oven. These are issues you simply might not have thought of, but that could soon lead to the solar ovens being used to patch roofs or keep animal feed dry instead of for cooking.

If we are trying to bring about change, it's not enough to say, "My way is the better way." We have to be listening and watching, not just talking. We can only help others if we reach out with an open mind – and with the knowledge, the commitment, and the perseverance to deliver on what we promise.

Γιορτάζουν οι Ροταριανοί

α 107 τους χρόνια θα γιορτάσουν στις 23 Φεβρουαρίου οι ανά τον κόσμο Ροταριανοί. Ο πρώτος Ροταριανός όμιλος στην Κύπρο ιδρύθηκε το 1938 στη Λευκωσία.

Έκτοτε έχουν σχηματιστεί άλλοι 18 όμιλοι Ροταριανών, εκ των οποίων οι 16 βρίσκονται στις ελεύθερες περιοχές και τρει στα κατεχόμενα. Τα μέλη των Ροταριανών στην Κίπρο ξεπερνούν τα 900, ενώ ανά το

παγκόσμιο υπάρχουν Ι,2 εκατομμύρια εγγεγραμμένοι Ροτισμονοί σε περισσότερους από 34 χιλιάδες ομίλους. Ιδρυτής του πρώτου Ροταριανού ομίλου στο Σικάγο των Ηνωμένων Πολιτετών Αμερικής ήταν ο Πολ Χάρις, ενώ τα ιδρυτικά μέλη του πρώτου Ροταριανού

ομίλου στην Κύπρο ήταν ο Κώστας Μαγκλής, ο Ζήνων Πιερίδης, ο Θεόδωρος Αρτέμης, ο Στέλιος Γεωργαλλίδης κ.ά.

Ανοικτές πόρτες

Όπως σημειώνουν στην ιστοσελίδα τους, κύριος στόχος τους είναι η προσφορά στις τοπικές κοινωνίες και στους επαγγελματικούς χώρους. Μότο τους είναι το «Service above Self» (η προσφορά πάνω από το άτομο). Οι ίδιοι αποποιούνται την ταμπέλα των μασόνων που τους αποδίδεται, υπογραμμίζοντας ότι δεν βάζουν κριτήρια στην εγγραφή μελών, είτε αυτά αφορούν σε εθνικότητα, είτε σε θρησκεία, είτε σε πολιτική ιδεολονία.

Μιλώντας στον «Π», η υπεύθυνη δημοσίων σχέσεων των Ροταριανών Κύπρου Έλενα Τάνου πρόσθεσε ότι οι συνεδρίες



όλων των ομίλων είναι ανοικτές σε όποιον επιθυμεί να τις παρακολουθήσει.

Εμβολιασμοί

Το μεγαλύτερο και σημαντικότερο έργο τους είναι η συνεισφορά στην παγκόσμια εξαφάνιση της πολιομυελίτιδας. Από το 1985 οι Ροταριανοί έχουν εισφέρει \$850 εκατομμύρια και δεκάδες χιλιάδες εργατοώρες εθελοντικά, για τον εμβολιασμό τουλάχιστον δύο δισεκατομμυρίων παιδιών στον κόσμο. Η προσφορά τους έχει αναγνωριστεί από τον Παγκόσμιο Οργανισμό γγείας και τη Unicef. Σε συνεργασία με το 1δρυμα Γκέιτς (του μεγαλομετόχου της Μίστοsoft Μπιλ Γκέιτς), οι Ροταριανοί έχουν δεσμευτεί να συγκεντρώσουν άλλα \$200 εκατ. για την πλήρη εξαφάνιση της ασθένειας μέχρι το τέλος Ιουνίου.

«Στρατολόγηση»

Όσον αφορά τη συμμετοχή νέων στους Pοταριανούς, μέσω του προγράμματος Rotaract οι κατά τόπους όμιλοι προσελκιόουν νέους και νέες από 18 έως 30 ετών για να συμμετέχουν εθελοντικά στις εργασίες τους. Υπολογίζεται ότι 200 χιλιάδες άνθρωποι από 8.700 ομίλους σε 171 χώρες συμμετέχουν στο Rotaract.

Τρέχοντα πρότζεκτ

Στην Κύπρο, οι Ροταριανοί όμιλοι επικεντρώνονται στην προσφορά υποτροφιών σε αριστούχους μαθητές οι οποίοι δεν έχουν την οικονομική δυνατότητα να οπουδάσουν, τη χορηγία εξοπλισμού σε ιατρικά κέντρα και στην ανάδειξη του πολιτισμού.







Celebrate in Bangkok with Rotary's extended family

For four days in May, Bangkok, Thailand, will suddenly become a home away from home for thousands of Rotarians from all over the world. For Binota and me, the Rotary International Convention is always the highlight of our year, as we get to spend four amazing days in the

company of our extended Rotary family. There's something wonderful about walking into a Rotary convention and knowing that, no matter how different we might look, we all have so much in common — and we all call one another by first names.

An RI Convention is a family reunion, and so much more: It's a time to celebrate, a time to connect with fellow Rotarians, and the best way I know to get inspired for the new Rotary year.

As Rotary leaders, many of you have already had the chance to attend a convention, and know already what a fantastic, unique experience it is. But whether you are a convention veteran or have never been to a convention before, I urge you not to let the 103rd RI Convention pass you by. There is still time to register for the best convention yet, in Thailand, the Land of a Thousand Smiles.

STRENGTH IN NUMBERS

How diverse is your club?

Making sure your club reflects your community

Ten years ago, the Rotary Club of Cupertino, California, USA, had about 100 members — nearly all of them white men. Today, it boasts a growing membership that better reflects its predominantly Asian community. How did the club do it?

"We made ourselves relevant to the community we serve," says Past District Governor Don Allen, a member of the Cupertino club. The club's membership, which has doubled, is now 27 percent Asian, 34 percent female, and 20 percent under age 50.

The club drew on its community leaders' classification to attract Asian nonprofit executives in the area.

"We also forged a relationship with the Shin Shin Educational Foundation and helped raise funds to refurbish rural schools in China," Allen says. The club also worked with the Sankara Eye Foundation to provide eye surgeries in India, "and we became relevant to that community," he adds.

Promoting member diversity is one of Rotary's strategic goals, and is emphasized in the RI Statement on Diversity in the <u>Rotary Code of Policies</u>, which encourages clubs to reflect their community in professional and business classification, gender, age, religion, and ethnicity.

In Brazil, the Rotary Club of Resende-Campos Eliseos, Rio de Janeiro, has gained more female members by inviting couples to join. "It keeps our club balanced, plus members are already familiar with each other and Rotary," says club president Renata Santos, a 30-year-old Afro-Brazilian.

In Australia and New Zealand, an initiative is underway to increase female club membership to 40 percent by 2015. Strategies include highlighting prominent

female Rotarians, creating satellite clubs, and encouraging female members to recruit their friends, relatives, and colleagues.

Another approach is launching culturally based clubs. Don Kremer, a past governor of District 5230 (California) who helped start the Rotary clubs of Fresno Latino and Monterey Korean, notes: "We have a great opportunity to develop new members while helping our communities."

CLUB CLINIC

Thinking strategically

Create a plan to define your club's vision and achieve its objectives

While all Rotary clubs aim to do their best, a thriving club is one with the ability to turn ideas into reality, based on strategic goals set by the club itself. A strategic plan to ensure continuity and efficiency is key.

Continuity

Electing new club leadership every year can be a challenge to sustaining a club's vision over the long term. A sitting club president may be promoting water projects, for example, while the president-elect wants to focus only on New Generations programs.

Rotary leaders are seeing the need to move beyond the "my year as president" mentality and encourage planning initiatives that represent the entire club's vision. Strategic plans can guide the current president's work with the president-elect, president-nominee, and immediate past president, thereby smoothing out the year-to-year transition. The same principle holds for committee chairs and others in club leadership positions.

The Rotary Club of Hout Bay, South Africa, had just completed its strategic plan when Patrick McLaughlin, then club president, became ill. "Everyone bumped up while I was in hospital, because we had implemented the succession plan in time," McLaughlin says.



Efficiency

A strategic plan not only ensures that the club is working toward its goals, it also maximizes the efforts to reach those goals. "You can get more done with less effort, and it's a more productive use of volunteer time and more rewarding for everyone," says Don Evans, past president of the Rotary Club of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, who also chairs the club's strategic planning committee.

Here's how to get the most out of the strategic planning process:

- Secure club participation and support from members.
- Seek assistance from Rotarians with professional strategic planning experience.
- Consult with other Rotary leaders to align the club plan with the plans of your district (work with your governor) and zone (work with your <u>Rotary coordinator</u>).
